Hickman Hospital on track to open in August

Construction of ProMedica's newest hospital on M-52

"A lot has changed since August," said Dr. Julie Yaroch, president of

ProMedica Bixby and Herrick Hospitals, referring to construction of the new ProMedica Charles and Virginia Hickman Hospital, which began with a groundbreaking in June 2017. The

220,000-square-foot campus on M-52 is centrally located to provide access for residents in Lenawee County and surrounding communities and will replace Tecumseh's Herrick Hospital and Adrian's Bixby Hospital.

The new 205,000-square-foot hospital will hold 58 acute care beds, four operating rooms, three minor procedure rooms, a cardiac rehabilitation unit and sleep clinic, intensive care and a step-down unit, outpatient cardiovascular, pulmonary and neurology clinics, diagnostic imaging services, and more. It is about 75% complete.

On the second and third floors the countertops are installed in the operating rooms and painting and flooring have been finished. Two medical/sur-

gical units, critical care and labor and delivery are being painted, with countertops and cabinetry going in. "A lot of the finishing touches are already occurring on our second and third floors," Yaroch said. "The last floor to get completed is our first floor, because that is the floor that gets the majority of the traffic when you're under construction for all of the floors above that."

Drywall is up in the emergency and radiology departments on the first floor. The cafeteria, unlike the basement cafeterias in Herrick and Bixby hospitals, will be above ground with glass, stone columns, and seating both indoors and out.

Yaroch said some changes are being made for some of the rooftops.

"Because of the different levels of our hospital, some of our main windows look out on to rooftops. It's not the most attractive to look at a black rooftop, so we are going to do some green rooftops in some locations," she said. A hallway on the second floor with a waiting and break area will look out onto a rooftop where succulents will be planted to soften up the appearance. The same treatment will occur on other

A once-yearly event based in religion and brought to this country through Polish culture has given donut-lovers paczki, pronounced "punch key." These rich donuts are deep fried, filled with various fillings and covered with powdered sugar or icing, and donut connoisseurs await their arrival each spring, salivating at the thought of devouring the decadent sweetness.

In Tecumseh, Lev's Bakery at 124 E. Chicago Blvd. is gearing up for a busy three days of mixing, rolling, frying, filling and glazing close to 900 dozen of the tasty treats, preparing for an onslaught of customers who will line up to purchase their favorite flavors on Monday and Tuesday, Feb. 24 and 25.

Baker to seek reelection as city mayor

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Mayor Jack Baker announced that he will seek reelection in the November 2020 election at Monday's city council meeting.

"I have filed my petition to once again run for the office of mayor," Baker said. "I am eager to lead this city for another two-year term."

Baker has served as the mayor of Tecumseh for six years prior to this term. He stated that his priorities are and continue to be economic development, improving infrastructure, and providing resources for the fire and police departments.

"As I have often said, the decisions made by local elected officials have a far greater impact on our residents than any decisions made at any other level of government," Baker concluded.

Prior to this announcement, the council approved a capital improvement plan over the next six years for the city. This will affect the 2020-2021 through 2025-2026 fiscal years.

"We are deep into the budget process now," City Manager Dan Swallow said. "These are larger ticket items that may take more effort to find funding. It also looks forward for the next five years so we can save."

Each department submitted the projects that they think would need the biggest capital improvements. Swallow outlined the projects they are hoping to complete during the 2020-2021 fiscal year. Some of these projects include the re-roofing of City Hall, rehabilitation of the ladder truck for emergency services, and street repairs through the Department of Public Works. Other projects in future fiscal years are more

tentative as funding becomes available. These improvements are subject to budget allocation over the next six years.

The council also approved a plan for a regional grant for the Tecumseh Fire Department in conjunction with neighboring fire departments. The 2019 Assistance to Firefighter Grant program is conducted through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), which encourages regions to apply rather than single departments. Chief Joe Tuckey explained that six other departments in the area, including Adrian, Hudson, and Morenci, will work together to write this grant.

This grant will be used to purchase self-contained breathing apparatus, including air packs, spare bottles, and face pieces, for the departments and will cover 90% of the cost.

"This is the only grant program available to fire services on a large scale," said Tuckey. "It's all ready to go. We just have to get our paperwork in order between the seven entities."

Baker commended the fire department on its work to receive this grant in partnering with other departments. He explained that he thinks it is important for regions to work together for grants.

"As long as I sit on this council, I will continue to push for regional cooperation between our fire departments," said Baker. "I think it's the wave of the future."

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Inner Space

I got a new pair of glasses last week.

It sounds simple, getting a new pair of glasses. But this accomplishment was anything but simple.

In October I picked out new frames and was prescribed new lenses to replace my 10-year-old glasses, only to find that the lenses were not right for me. Even after having them re-made, my vision was distorted and I felt disoriented while reading, walking or driving, which is most of my existence. After talking to a vision insurance representative I returned the lenses and received a refund, and was approved to go to a different doctor for a second eye exam.

The specialist I chose was in Toledo. Because my eyes want to go their own way, causing double vision, I needed a doctor who could prescribe the correct prism lenses so I could function as a somewhat normal human being with adequate eyesight. They scheduled my appointment for December 31, which was perfect as I had the day off.

The morning of December 31 dawned with a hearty snowstorm. I drove 15 miles below the speed limit on icy and drifted roads to get to the doctor's office, and told the woman at the intake desk that she needed to call my insurance company on the phone to get the approval, since my appointment was a special case. I then waited for my name to be called for the pre-appointment interrogation.

A young woman took me to a room to gather my medical and vision history, but soon another woman interrupted us to tell me I was not approved for the exam and I'd have to pay for it myself or else wait to talk to my insurance company to clear up the matter. After the harrowing drive that morning, I was distraught. I tried to convince them to allow me to call the insurance company then and there, but they said there wasn't time. I had to reschedule my appointment for three weeks hence. I discovered when I went to check out that no one had made that phone call I'd requested when I first arrived at the office. Human error, as they say.

It seemed my vision deteriorated even more while I waited for my appointment, but I think I was just tired of looking at everything through a hazy blur. I was cynical about anything turning out well at that point.

I finally received my new glasses last Wednesday. When I put them on I remembered the first time I'd been able to see for real, when I was in third grade. Back then I'd had to sit at the front of the class and still couldn't see the chalkboard. I couldn't read road signs from the car on road trips with my family. My life was blurry. I'm surprised I wasn't more accident prone, since I could only see shapes and outlines. No wonder my memories of those early years are vague.

On that first drive home from the eye doctor, wearing my new cat-eye glasses and feeling snazzy, I read ALL the road signs. I could see tree branches and leaves and details I never knew existed. My young world grew 100 times that day, and from then on I wore my glasses every waking moment. They were my window to vast possibilities where previously I didn't even know what I was missing.

This time the change wasn't so dramatic, but it was exhilarating just the same. I'm thrilled with the sharpness of my vision and my ability to read. I can drive and walk without mishap. It's incredible what a difference seeing clearly makes.

Often the long haul to get to a better place seems fraught with lost hope. This applies to more than just needing new glasses. We may stumble through challenges, waiting for a change that will make things better. But we still need to keep taking steps regardless of how many bumps we encounter, because doing something is more productive than despair.

I complained about my eyeglass saga, but complaining didn't do me any good. The same goes for most things in life. Having said that, let's make this year the one where more people vote than those who do not. The Michigan presidential primary is March 10. Action or anguish? It's up to you.

Daughter proud of Karras' Pro Football Hall of Fame honor

The first day of February was a meaningful and life-changing day for Tecumseh resident Carolyn Karras. It was the day before Super Bowl LIV and she and her husband, Dan Olivier, were in Miami, Fla. On that day, her father, Alex Karras, a defensive tackle for the Detroit Lions from 1958-1970, was honored as one of 10 senior-era inductees into the 2020 Pro Football Hall of Fame Centennial Class.

According to detroitlions.com, Alex Karras came to the Lions in 1958 as a first-round draft pick from Iowa, where he was a two-time All-American and winner of the 1957 Outland Trophy as college football's best lineman. He was chosen for the Associated Press All Pro first team three times and for the second team four times, played in four Pro Bowls and was a member of the 1960s All Decade team.

He received a one-year suspension for the 1963 season for gambling on sports, which Carolyn said might have caused those who vote for inductees to pass him by. "Forty-five years we've been waiting for him to get in the Hall of Fame," she said. Except for that suspension, Alex only missed one game in his career. He played 161 games, with 156 starts.


During his one-year hiatus, he found another way to occupy his time and make money. A rookie professional wrestler before signing with the Lions, he took up the activity again, pairing with another wrestler, Dick the Bruiser, to set up a fight in Detroit.

Before his retirement from football he became an actor. His film debut was in "Paper Lion" (1968), playing himself as a member of the Detroit Lions and starring with Alan Alda, Lauren Hutton and George Plimpton. Other film roles included Mongo in "Blazing Saddles" (1974), George Zaharias, husband of Babe Didrickson, in the television movie "Babe" (1975), Sheriff Wallace in "Porky's" (1981) and Mr. Bernstein in "Victor Victoria" (1982). He played a starring role as George Papadopolis in the sitcom series "Webster" from 1983 to 1988.

"He went from the Lions to 'Monday Night Football,' he announced on that for a while," Carolyn said, of her father's time as a television sports announcer with famed announcers Howard Cosell and Frank Gifford.

Carolyn lived in Bloomfield Hills until her father moved to California to star in the film "Babe" and her parents subsequently got a divorce. After her mother moved her and her four brothers to the Tecumseh area when Carolyn was in the 10th grade, she attended Clinton High School. She has worked as a member of the grounds crew at Hidden Lake Gardens for the past 20 years.

She said about a year and a half ago she made the ef-

fort to find out who the Hall of Fame voters were, and she began contacting them to urge them to vote for her father. "Look at his record," she said. "He was a guy that just his record should get him in."

"To be honest, the Centennial Class will never happen again for another hundred years, so the fact that they waited for that long to put him in, it means everything to me," she said. "The people that he got in with, people that I met in Miami, it could not have been a better time for him to go in, and it was worth the wait."

Her father passed away on October 10, 2012, but Carolyn said she could feel his presence with her as she traveled to Florida on his behalf. In the hotel where she stayed, she was surrounded by well-known football players and coaches. "From Joe Montana, Joe Namath, Jim Brown to Peyton Manning,

Barry Sanders, everybody was in the suite or at my hotel," she said. "These people aren't famous to me, these people are like my family. I cannot tell you what it was like. Franco Harris, Don Shula, Jim Kelly. Everybody was there at that thing."

She will get a private tour of the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio in March, and will also be at the August and September ceremonies. Her father will officially be inducted into the Hall of Fame in September.

"I watched him play on a black-and-white TV on Thanksgiving, because I was little," she said, remembering how it felt to see her father play football. Now she relishes the fact that he's receiving what she feels is a long overdue honor.

"It is absolute euphoria, for him, and for it coming full circle to where I'm representing him in the best way that anybody could. I am continuing his legacy," said Carolyn.

Roundup: Killer of weeds, soil and food nutrition

Most everyone has heard the television advertisements regarding the lawsuits about Roundup and what exposure has done to the health of individuals exposed to it. These lawsuits claim that it is carcinogenic and farmers, landscape personnel, and anyone exposed to this chemical for prolonged periods of usage are susceptible to cancer and remediation. With this background, it is important to look at some facts about Monsanto's Roundup.

Roundup, is well known for farm usage to keep weeds under control on croplands. It is also known for its use on residential properties to keep weeds under control. All told, the United States alone utilizes 300 million pounds of Roundup annually. The primary chemical in Roundup, glyphosate, was originally used in 1964 to clean boilers and steam parts. It descaled corrosive materials because it was a mineral chelator, which is a chronically toxic chemical: it grabs on to minerals and demobilizes them.

When Roundup is sprayed on cropland, it kills weeds. This usually occurs within 3-5 days of exposure. Glyphosate attacks the root system of the weed, and at the same time chelates out essential nutrients in the soil that are necessary to the growth of plants. So, the weed is starved of essential nutrients it needs to continue to grow, and dies off. The nutrients in the soil, like nitrogen, phosphorous and many others, are chelated, or demobilized by the chemical. People will notice that the weeds are dying, but the crops in the same field are not.

Many plants now are glyphosate resistant or GMO (Genetically Modified Organism) developed plants that are not affected by Roundup. They are designed to grow even on a glyphosate sprayed fields. One might say this is pretty amazing science until you look

below the surface of what is really happening in the soil and in the plants.

Consider the soil. Once glyphosate is sprayed on the soil, it stays there for a while. According to Dr. Don Huber, Professor Emeritus of Plant Pathology at Purdue University, glyphosate has a residual lifetime of anywhere from 1.5 to 22 years. Eventually, this makes the soil 'sterile', and stimulates soil pathogens to emerge. Continuing to utilize glyphosate, as most farmers do, repeats this process of leaching essential minerals from the soil. Poor soil, in turn, causes poor nutrition in plants. Then, since the soil is subject to soilborne diseases, the plants do not have an ideal environment to grow and thrive. Since nutrients have been chelated out, that reduces nutrient uptake in the plants. Plants are also compromised because they simply cannot work as efficiently. According to Dr. Huber, GMO plants also have reduced water efficiency, which means glyphosate plants take two times as much water to grow because the plant is less efficient. This is so, again, because the chelated soil compromises the entire growing process.

Livestock that feed on the crops produced on glyphosate fields are also affected. It requires more food to feed cattle because plant nutrition is compromised, requires more supplements to maintain the nutrition needed to maintain health, and more use of antibiotics to keep livestock healthy. This is true for beef, pig, poultry or any other meat based product.

It also affects the general public, because livestock is affected by the soil and plant environment contaminated by Roundup, which means the general public is eating less nutritious food, with more antibiotics and other chemicals designed to keep livestock healthy due to reduced enriched food sources. Even a vegan diet is affected unless it

is grown on certified organic soils.

Once the gene environment is disrupted, according to Dr. Huber, unexpected viruses or other gene products begin to emerge new to current science. This may explain why there is a higher frequency of human genetic diseases emerging like diabetes, Crohn's disease, leaky gut syndrome, colitis, celiac disease, and autism. Infertility issues have become more frequent and there is a 59% decrease in sperm viability in humans today. Bees are dying since they pollinate on glyphosate fields, and rivers and streams are contaminated because water run off from farm fields flow directly into them and into our Great Lakes causing a 'green' Lake Erie. Fish die, but we still eat fish that exist in waters from glyphosate saturated fields.

So what is the solution since we have mega corporate farms now designed to feed an overpopulated planet? Some farmers, like Chuck Lievens of Blissfield, plants radishes that decompose to replenish the lost nutrients that are immobilized by glyphosate. He also uses "nutritious" ground cover during winter to add nutrients to the soil. Small to medium sized farmers are much better stewards of our farmlands than corporate farms.

We could also communicate to Monsanto that it engaged in deceptive advertising regarding their glyphosate product, in that it negatively affects our soils, compromises our plant nutrition, and contaminates the drinking water on our planet. This affects every aspect of consumption along the human food chain. This is not a sustainable chemical for an already compromised planet.

New hospital on target for completion

rooftops that can be viewed from second-story patient rooms.

One of the rooftops viewable from the third story, while not conducive to plantings, will have an artistic rendering of a river running through a landscape, created with colored stone and glass.

Finishing touches on the hospital include picking out furniture and artwork for the donor wall, which will give thanks to all who have contributed throughout the years as well as those who helped fund the new campus.

The construction project is on target to be completed in June, and Yaroch said there are a lot of behind-the-scenes organizational meetings to discuss how patients will be moved on August 27, the target date for

transitioning to the new building, how operations will change for frontline staff and making sure they will have the education they need before the hospital opens.

The health and wellness building, which will house the Lenawee County YMCA as well as physical therapy and other services, is about 30% complete and is set to be finished in July with a hoped-for opening date sometime in August.

Yaroch said that if patients have any concerns about where to go for their care when the opening date for the hospital nears, they may call the switchboard at Bixby Hospital at 265.0292 for further information. ProMedica will continue to share updates on the process as the date for opening gets nearer.

Funding for the new hospital has been on track, with the goal well within sight. "We're on the last million dollars of this campaign, so we're close to finishing. It was an \$18 million campaign and we are somewhere around the \$17 million mark," she said.

"We've been talking about this project for years. I've been in Lenawee County since '99 and I've heard about this for probably 10 years. We'd get forward momentum and then we would have to halt for changes in healthcare climate and then we'd move forward again," said Yaroch. "It's really exciting to be at this point. There's a lot of moving pieces and we have a really dedicated team that shares in the excitement and also the commitment to make sure that

moving from two existing facilities into the new one will be as seamless as possible."

Already on site, ProMedica Farms, located on three acres bordered by M-52 and Shepherd Road, includes several barns, walking paths, and a hoop house for indoor growing, part of ProMedica's effort to encourage healthy eating and preventative care. The farm produces food for the traveling Veggie Mobile as well as providing an alternative rehabilitation site for patients. The hospital's campus will include two and a half miles of walking trails.

"It's been worth the wait. When those doors open up, I hope the community will share in our excitement and our joy," Yaroch said.



only ones with chocolate custard," he said. "We'll start making them on Sunday afternoon." They will continue to make the treats on Monday and Tuesday to satisfy their customers. Their paczki will also be sold at Jerry's Market in Tecumseh and at Perky Pantry locations. "Jerry's Market will get 20 dozen on Monday and 20 dozen on Tuesday," said Roger.

"We can't make them fast enough," said Lev. "When we open up the door Monday we'll have probably 300 dozen rolled."

They create a traditional paczki that is rounded and solid, not a "jelly ball," Lev said. Their product is more time-consuming as it takes twice as long to fry them, but the results are worth it. On Sunday morning they will bring in an additional fryer as

well as a rounder that will help reduce some of the hands-on work that has made for 15-hour days in the past.

According to dictionary.com, Mardi Gras is French for "Fat Tuesday," the last opportunity to eat rich food before the fast of Lent begins. For those who observe, Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, which is February 26, when religious fasting commences in preparation for the Holy day of Easter. Traditionally 40 days of fasting, meaning one meal a day and full fasting on Friday, Lent did not allow for the consumption of rich foods. The last Tuesday before Lent, the people in Poland would use up their food so it would not be spoiled or wasted, so eggs, butter, sugar and fruit were combined to make paczki so they could indulge one last

time before their diets were restricted.

Michigan State University Extension's website expounds on the history of Paczki Day, which started in the medieval age during the reign of August III. An ancient Roman festival honoring the deities Luperalia and Saturnalia, which took place in mid-February, was the precursor to today's Mardi Gras. When Christians came to Rome, they incorporated the festival into Lenten preparations.

With Polish immigrants settled in places such as Detroit, Baltimore, Grand Rapids, Saginaw, Chicago, Buffalo and especially Hamtramck, Polish bakeries would have paczki for sale on Fat Tuesday morning, and in smaller communities the local Polish parish came together to make and sell paczki.

The strict rules for fasting among Roman Catholics have relaxed since World War II, but many Catholics still observe fasts from meat on Fridays during Lent and may abstain from certain pleasures such as sweets, alcohol, or other indulgences in order to focus on spiritual matters.

Regardless of one's religious affiliation, paczki-lovers are everywhere. Lev's will have eight different flavors of paczki to choose from by the time they open their doors Monday morning. They include strawberry, blueberry, raspberry, lemon, apple, chocolate custard, vanilla custard, and kreme, which will sell for \$14 a dozen or \$21 for a dozen and a half, and \$1.25 each. 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
