## Officials respond as virus spreads into state

Closing of schools, businesses and widespread cancelations disrupt everyday life in Tecumseh

With news changing by the hour, the novel coronavirus, COVID-19, which had its start in Wuhan, China, has changed life drastically for citizens of Tecumseh, of Lenawee County, of Michigan, of the United States, of the world. The World Health Organization (WHO) declared the global outbreak a pandemic on March 11, and every day since the first U.S. citizen was diag-

nosed on January 24 the outlook has become more serious and the measures taken more far-ranging.

On March 10 Michigan announced its first presumptive positive cases of COVID-19, and Governor Gretchen Whitmer declared a state of emergency to slow the spread of the virus. The next day the state recommended community mitigation strategies, which included learning about the signs and symptoms of COVID-19; staying home when sick; avoiding others who are sick; washing

hands thoroughly with soap and water for at least 20 seconds; maintaining a home supply of medications, food, and other essentials; reducing in-person gatherings and activities; considering tele-learning or tele-working opportunities; and limiting non-essential work travel, among other actions.

On March 12 Whitmer ordered all statewide K-12 school buildings to be closed from Monday, March 16 through Sunday, April 5, and local colleges halted classes with plans to

continue educating students online. Ten more cases of COVID-19 were announced on that day. The Whitmer administration expanded telemedicine to allow patients to connect with health-care providers without in-person visits.

Four more cases of the virus were reported in the state on March 13. The majority of the cases centered around the Detroit area, and at first most were linked to international or domestic travel, but as more were diagnosed it was suspected that the illness was be-

ing spread by community contact in the state.

The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) granted the Michigan Department of Education's (MDE) request to waive the regulatory requirement that children eat meals together and at schools, allowing schools to provide breakfast and lunch for all students. Tecumseh Public Schools began providing meals for parents and

## City Hall open for 'urgent' business only

Mayor Jack Baker and City Manager Dan Swallow gave a statement regarding COVID-19 and the city's plan at Monday night's city council meeting. The city has announced several precautions and steps they are taking to ensure the safety of its residents.

"It is important to remember that while you may believe that some of these precautions are an overreaction, they are designed to slow the spread of the virus and protect those at-risk populations," said Baker.

The city will be taking precautions to ensure that all buildings are cleaned and sanitized as well as limiting the number of people that enter the buildings. They are encouraging residents to pay their bills online as much as possible via the city website and only come to City Hall for urgent business. The main entrance to City Hall will be closed, and visitors will be asked to enter through the police department where they will determine if the need is urgent.

Swallow has also encouraged city employees and residents to practice social dis-

tancing, as recommended by the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). This means staying home when you are feeling ill and only leaving your residence when absolutely necessary. He has suggested that city business be conducted over the phone or online as much as possible to slow the spread of the virus. City employees have been asked to practice good hand hygiene and help clean high-frequency areas.

In addition to these measures, the city has cancelled or postponed all events larger than ten people, per the recommendation of the CDC. The council is looking for alternative means of having their meetings open to the public without passing this limit.

"We are looking at ways for the public to listen in on council meetings," said Swallow. "This could be a number to call for a conference call or using Facebook Live."

At the end of the meeting, the council voted on the appointments of several individuals to various boards, including the Construction Board of Appeals and Retirement System Board of Trustees. All appointments were approved.

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## Inner Space

On Sunday, March 8, I hit a deer on my way home. I had seven miles to go before I reached my house, and on North Adrian Highway just north of Ives Road a deer walked out of the field and into my path. My car was crunched and I was shook up. I was glad I wasn't injured, but I was sad about the bad news that my car would need repair.

The next morning I called my auto insurance company and found out that because I hit a deer and not another car, my deductible for the repairs would be only \$100 instead of \$500. I was happy at that bit of good news.

I drove my car to the auto body shop, bits of plastic falling off of it as I went, and spoke to a man in the shop's office about the loaner vehicle they'd said they would have ready for me. I was given a set of keys and walked out to the back of the lot, where the fellow pointed out a red older model car and then turned and headed back to the office.

The rustbucket they gave me was even more alarming inside than it was on the outside. The acrid smell of cigarette smoke clung to the upholstery. Loose tobacco filled the console, and cigarette ashes covered the steering wheel column. There was a coating of dog hair on every seat, so thick it looked like it was part of the fabric. Taco sauce packets in the door, the remnants of a plastic beverage bottle in the console, and a container of gum were additional perks to my chariot. I sat there confused. This had to be a mistake.

I went back into the office and alerted them to the sorry state of the car. Someone was assigned to "detail" the car and I sat in the office and waited. The detail on the car didn't take, I guess, because besides the outside having been washed, fewer tobacco shreds and ashes, and the inside a little less hairy, it didn't look much different. I was given an apology and a promise that I would get a better ride in a day or two. I thought that was bad news,

but by 4 p.m. that day I was driving a new vehicle.

At the time, I thought I knew what bad news was.

Two days later I heeded advice about the coronavirus, COVID-19, and asked to work from home, since I am of a certain age and I as well as my loved ones are in the "vulnerabilities" category. It was good news that my boss, publisher Jim Lincoln, understood my concern and approved my request.

Since then the bad news has been coming in left and right. Every day there is another announcement of shut-downs and closures, and the count of people diagnosed with the virus is growing. Our country's people and leaders are now taking this virus very seriously, and I appreciate the actions that our governor has taken to close schools, restaurants, bars, gyms and other venues where people gather. I know that was necessary, as a portion of the population didn't seem to understand the importance of "social distancing," to prevent mass sickness, as if it didn't apply to them.

The past couple of weeks have had a lot of bad news. The good news is that for the most part, people are complying with the recommendations to stay home if they can. Those who think this is an overreaction are also bad news. They are the ones who will pass the virus on to others by disregarding the warnings to practice "social distancing" by staying at least three, preferably six, feet away from others. Virus-laden breath and unwashed hands are the enemy here, and we humans would do best to save ourselves by stepping up and doing the responsible things.

I've seen further good news in how people I know, mostly by connecting on Facebook, are encouraging, uplifting, and offering to help others. That's how we survive. No person is an island, although home isolation may feel that way. We need to work together to save lives, and tip the scales to keep people safe. We can do this together. We can do this.



# COVID-19 response statement

Dear Residents-

The City of Tecumseh is following the recommendations of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS), and the Lenawee County Health Department in response to the confirmed cases of Coronavirus COVID-19 in Michigan. First and foremost, we are taking steps to protect the health and safety of our city employees and residents to the maximum extent practical. At the same time, we are doing our best to maintain uninterrupted city services for our residents and business owners. Some of the steps the city has taken already include:

- Sharing the latest updates from the state, federal and county health agencies with our residents.
- Restricting access to city buildings to city staff, tenants, contractors or urgent business only. Please call or e-mail ahead to see if your transaction can be accomplished remotely, or to set up an appointment.
- Postponing in-home inspections and service calls until at least April 15, 2020.
- Advising city employees on appropriate hygiene, including frequent washing of hands.

• Practicing social distancing. We are asking employees to conduct City business via phone or remotely when practical. You may be contacted by the city to postpone or reschedule an in-person appointment.

• Conducting more thorough cleaning of city facilities, including wiping down of door handles, countertops and other surfaces people regularly touch.

• Encouraging residents to utilize on-line resources to obtain information, pay their water and sewer bills, apply for building permits, or conduct other city related business. The on-line portals are all available on the city website at [www.mytecumseh.org](http://www.mytecumseh.org).

• Allowing more flexibility for employees to utilize paid time off to make sure those who may be exhibiting symptoms stay home, or to help them take care of school age children.

We encourage the businesses in Tecumseh to adopt many of these same practices that can help to prevent the spread of the virus.

City officials have also reached out to our businesses and organizations that work with the at-risk populations which include older adults, and individuals with an existing health condition or that are immune system com-

promised. We have offered assistance and asked how we can best serve their clientele.

It is important to remember that while you may believe that some of these precautions are an overreaction, they are designed to slow the spread of the virus and protect those at-risk populations. While you may be healthy and could easily weather an infection, you don't want to spread it to someone for which it could be a life-threatening condition.

If you have questions, we encourage you to contact a healthcare professional. The CDC, MDHHS and Lenawee County Health Department are also posting regular updates on their websites. ## State hotline answers questions about COVID-19

The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services now has a hotline for residents regarding the COVID-19 virus. other state government departments. The hotline will be open seven days a week from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at 1.888.535.6136. Staff cannot provide individual clinical advice or a diagnosis through the hotline. Those who believe they have been exposed to COVID-19, whether they have symptoms or not, should call their health

care provider. Those without a health care provider should call the nearest hospital or urgent care, but patients are advised to always call first. Patients with confirmed infection have reported mild to severe respiratory illness with symptoms of fever, cough, shortness of breath and pneumonia.

## State, ProMedica responds to COVID-19

students to pick up at Compass Learning Center and South Early Learning Center.

Also on March 13, the governor ordered a temporary halt to events and assemblages of over 250 people, to continue until April 5. Nine more cases of COVID-19 were announced on that day, eight more were added on March 14, and 20 more on March 15. A more recent statement by President Donald Trump advised citizens to avoid groups of more than 10. Some communities have gone so far as to order their residents to shelter in place in order to halt transmission of the virus.

Whitmer signed an executive order on March 16 temporarily closing restaurants, cafes, coffee houses, bars, taverns, brewpubs, distilleries, clubs, movie theaters, indoor and outdoor performance venues, gymnasiums, fitness centers, recreation centers, indoor sports facilities, exercise stu-

dios, spas, and casinos, allowing only take-out or delivery of food and beverages. She also signed an executive order to temporarily expand eligibility for unemployment benefits.

On March 17 the governor signed another executive order enhancing operational capacity and efficiency in hospitals. The Michigan Department of Education announced it would request a series of federal waivers of requirements in child nutrition, emergency food assistance, and commodity food programs, in accordance with federal guidance.

Locally, ProMedica, which runs Herrick Hospital in Tecumseh and Bixby Hospital in Adrian, released a statement that said, "With the potential for COVID-19 this season, we have implemented extra measures to help ensure our teams are organized and prepared to manage any potential risk to our commu-

nities. ProMedica is screening all patients who present themselves with new coronavirus-like symptoms, and we are prepared to treat patients in accordance with CDC recommendations in specially designated areas if needed.

"ProMedica has been planning for the potential arrival of COVID-19 for the past couple of months," the release stated. "We have stocked up on personal protective equipment to help safeguard direct care staff and prevent the transmission of COVID-19. We believe we are as prepared as any health system in the nation. We will continue to monitor COVID-19 updates closely and adjust our operational plans and procedures accordingly to help ensure the safety of our patients, visitors and employees should COVID-19 reach our area."

Visitors at hospitals and other facilities will be limited to only those who are absolutely neces-

sary, and screening of visitors for temperature and respiratory symptoms will be implemented. Friends and family members are encouraged to connect with their loved ones who are in ProMedica facilities using phone calls, email, texting, video chat or other electronic communications.

ProMedica physicians will be temporarily postponing non-essential, non-urgent office visits, tests and procedures, using their discretion to determine which appointments they will postpone. Any affected patients will be notified.

## City Abandons Plans for New Dam at Globe Pond

Construction of a new dam for Globe Mill Pond was set back a year, perhaps longer, at Council Monday night after property owners on the pond and race objected to paying a portion of the costs.

Cal Zorn, city manager, says the next move is probably up to the property owners if they want a dam and the water restored to the basin.

City officials have explored three programs in an effort to obtain state or federal aid to replace the dam washed out in the June 1968 flood. They've been rejected each time by state and federal authorities.

Monday night's meeting between property owners and the Council was to determine if the owners were willing to share in the costs. Out of 13 property owners present, only four expressed willingness to pay part

of the costs.

Since the city had been rejected for outside aid, officials had hopes of a special assessment for property owners, with each owner paying according to his frontage on the water.

Amount needed, according to the city manager, was \$35,000 with the city paying \$7,600. Property owners would have been assessed at the rate of \$2.28 per foot.

There are no plans now to replace the dam.

The meeting between Council and the property owners lasted well over an hour with several owners expressing their views, one of which had the city paying the entire cost.

It was pointed out that property owners were not asked to share in the cost of repairing and replacing the washout at the River Raisin bridge and dam on

N. Evans St.

Approximate cost here was \$21,000, including the construction of a barrier to prevent future washouts. To help meet this cost, the city received a gift of \$10,000, leaving \$11,000 left at city expense.

Repairs of this washout were rushed as the approach to the bridge was gone and the street closed to traffic.

There are 32 property owners on Globe Mill Pond and the average cost per property owner would have been about \$900 each. In some cases, some owners would pay considerably more, and in others, considerably less.

Plans for a new dam have been completed and reviewed by the state. When the plans were ordered along with borings and other tests at the pond site, officials were anticipating some outside funds.

## Fire Damages Set at \$1,500

Fire from a waste paper basket caused damages estimated by the Tecumseh Fire Department at \$1,500 at the Marlboro Apartments last Friday night.

According to the report, an ash tray of cigarettes in the Dale Bowen apartment was tossed into a container below the kitchen sink. Contents of the waste paper basket then caught fire.

Firemen found mostly intense heat when they arrived. The blaze had melted solder on a water line, causing water to spray out and help contain the fire. Some water damage, however, was inflicted on another apartment.

Firemen reported damages of \$1,000 to the building and \$500 to contents.

## Compromise on Dress to Students

A compromise in the high school dress code was approved by the School Board Monday after considerable discussion with Neville Hart, school principal.

The Board voted four to two for the compromise which will be presented by Mr. Hart to the Student Affairs Committee and the Dress Code Committee of the Student Assembly on Thursday.

Voting for the compromise were Dr. Fred Freeman, William Macbeth, William Brown and Dr. Don Phelan. Negative votes were cast by Dr. Harold Ocamb and Aden Mead.

## Some Pupils To Be Bussed Out of City

Unless there are other plans devised, many Tecumseh school district parents will probably be upset next fall when their youngsters trot off to school.

School officials are working out class and bus schedules for the 1970-71 term, and it now appears likely that some elementary pupils will be bussed from the city to the Tipton and Ridgeway schools.

The schools have elementary rooms available, but the shift in school-age population is providing problems. In some cases, it may be possible for a pupil to live within sight of an elementary building, such as youngsters in Lee Villa Trailer Park, but attend school in Tipton.

A youngster, for example, who has attended Patterson from kindergarten through the fifth grade, may find himself at Ridgeway for his sixth grade.

The two rural buildings have space while city classrooms are crowded.

## Tie Clasp Slows Shot, Saves Life

Richard Carmean, 42, of 610 W. Logan St., owes his life to a tie clasp.

District manager for the Detroit area for Cambridge Wire Cloth Co. Mr. Carmean was in the metropolitan area last Wednesday evening completing some business in preparation for a trip to Florida with his wife.

He left his room about midnight to obtain a brief case from his car in the motel parking lot, when he was accosted by a man in the dark, stating, You're not going anywhere, give me your money."

When Carmean didn't comply with his demands the thief backed off about five feet and shot Carmean in the abdomen.

Mrs. Carmean was called to her husband's bedside at Ford Hospital, due to his critical condition, and didn't recognize the seven twisted pieces of metal that physicians brought to her.

Doctors had removed them from the wound the attributed a minor nick in the patient's liver was due to the fact that the tie clasp had taken enough of the impact of the bullet to keep it from shattering the liver.

A spring from the tie clasp was imbedded in the head of the bullet. The tie clasp, a little larger and thicker than many was in the shape of a rock bass, an advertising piece used by the home office of Carmean's company.

"We are grateful to people here in Tecumseh, it's like we have lived here 20 years, and we only came last June 1 from Deerfield," remarked Mrs. Carmean.

The Carmeans have two children, Fred 12, and Carolyn 10.

December 22, 1826

Lenawee County splits from Monroe County to become a separate government entity; Tecumseh is named county seat. Until 1829, Lenawee County included the Southern tier of Michigan West of Monroe County

to the shores of Lake Michigan.

September 24, 1832

First school of higher education, a precursor to Tecumseh High School, opens for classes.

October 10, 1833

Cornerstone laid for the first church, St. Peter's Episcopal Church. The building was completed in 1835 from donations by Tecumseh's founding families. President Andrew Jackson also donated to the building fund. The church stood for 129 years when it was razed in 1962 to make way for a new church building.
