Lutheran churches welcome new pastors to Tecumseh

Both of Tecumseh's Lutheran churches gained new pastors this summer, bringing new faces to lead their congregations. The Reverend William Finn began his appointment at Grace English Evangelical Lutheran Church on July 21, and Gloria Dei Lutheran Church welcomed the Reverend Sarah Mayer-Flatt on August 19. Both bring to Tecumseh the enthusiasm and energy of faithful dedication.

Finn, a native of Wisconsin, lives in the church's rectory with his wife, Bonnie and their dogs. A graduate of the Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary with a Master's of Divinity degree, he has been a pastor for 21 years, leading two churches in Wisconsin and one in Iowa before landing in Michigan. "We came from a small town, even smaller, but the type of towns around us were just like

Tecumseh," he said. "Tecumseh has its own flair, I've noticed."

The Finns have been married 22 years and have a son and a daughter who still live in Wisconsin and a son serving in the Air Force in Germany. He said he and his wife received a wonderful welcome from the church and are enjoying getting to know the community by walking and biking in town, meeting people along the way. "It's just been fun to get to know our neighbors a little bit," Finn said, relating that they had made a connection with another person who owns a Shiba Inu, a type of dog the couple has. "I really like the atmosphere in Tecumseh. The previous pastor told me, 'You'll love it here,'" he said.

"There's just an amazing group of gifted people here, caring people here, generous people," said Finn. "They support their pastor, just looking

TPS math teachers get board support to return to teacher-driven curriculum

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A sixth grade math teacher and a high school math teacher joined forces Monday night to give a detailed presentation to the Tecumseh Public Schools (TPS) Board of Education in the hopes of convincing the board to alter the course of math instruction in the district for the new school year.

"During teacher interviews in June I had two teachers approach me with concerns about the Eureka math pro-

gram," said Interim Superintendent Greg Lewis in his introduction to the Math department update at Monday night's school board meeting. He stated that he told them if they could put a group of math teachers together who agreed with their concerns, he would meet with them. Of 13 teachers from sixth grade through high school, nine teachers showed up. "It was pretty unanimous, they weren't happy with Eureka math and wanted to know

Grant to aid in development of local industrial sites

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The alliance between Tecumseh and Adrian as an established "SmartZone" helped land an \$80,000 state grant to help industrial site readiness.

The grant award was announced Wednesday by the City of Tecumseh and the Michigan Economic Development Corp., which assisted in obtaining \$3.3 million in total

grants for 45 industrial sites in Michigan.

The local "SmartZone" is an LDFA (Local Development Finance Authority) that allows for "tax capture for the purpose of catalyzing the creation and attraction of high-tech business to our industrial park," according to the grant application submitted by Tecumseh and Adrian city administrators.

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Imagine That

I had my yearly eye exam this week, and it made me think about sight and vision. I got my first pair of glasses at age nine during a time when there were two choices of frames for kids rather than the possibly 7.75 million choices available in 2019.

Glasses, in general, weren't cool. Sitting in the chair at Dr. Deo's office in Saline as he gave me the battery of eye tests — lens one or lens two, lens a or lens b — I was unprepared during that first visit for what was about to happen to me.

Answering the questions made me nervous, like they were a test, rather than a choice of clear vision. At the end of the testing period, I sat with the big machine attached to my small face as Dr. Deo showed me how I would see with glasses.

To this day, almost 43 years later I remember the euphoria and excitement I felt seeing the world so clearly. If I could have worn that machine home I would have, just to see the world with perfect sight.

Waiting for the two or three weeks for the glasses to come in was torture. The day we went to pick up the glasses, I left the optometrist office wearing blue plastic frames and able to see EVERYTHING.

I could see texture in the leaves on the trees. I could see the hairs on the heads of my family. I could see the detail in the distance looking out the car window. I saw it all and felt pure ecstasy.

Wearing glasses wasn't cool, but I did not care. Being able to see faces of people walking by me in the hallway or read the lunch menu from far away was worth not being cool. Also, I am not sure I qualified as cool before I got my glasses, anyway.

My first pair of glasses had lenses that were actually glass, and frames that still slid down my small nose even though they fit the best of the two pairs available for nine-year-olds. I wonder what people today used to wearing ultra-light glasses would think wearing the heavy glasses that I adored.

Are people desperate enough to see whether someone is smiling or frowning at them to put up with discomfort? That's the true measurement of whether people are tough enough for good vision.

How much does anyone want to see clearly the world around us? It isn't just seeing the beautiful detail of flower petals and the pollen on the stamen; there are also times where one must view the dead baby bird on the ground under the tree and the flies flitting around it.

Good vision isn't just seeing the laughing faces of children, it is also recognizing the crying faces of children separated from their parents in a strange country. Those who work hard to only see what they want to see are truly myopic.

Looking at the face of a newborn baby is easy. That vision brings joy and delight. We recognize the future hidden behind the present if we see clearly.


Looking upon the face of someone who has died is a challenge. There is sadness and pain in those moments. We ache. Still, those with clear vision can see the joy and love that once animated that still and quiet mask of who once was there.

Good vision is important because life is filled with moments of sadness and horror, and to survive, we must see what was once beautiful or that transformation to beauty is possible. Sure, it's easier to have blurrier vision and not have to look at what is ugly, but I would not trade the clarity of perfect vision to see amazing things just to soften how well I see the awful.

Through my 20s and 30s I wore contacts, which sharpened my vision even more than glasses. I had clear peripheral vision and that was exciting.

No matter what moments life throws at me, I want to have the clearest vision possible to see reality. I don't search out life's ugliness to stare it down, but I am not afraid to see what is in front of me.

Spirit of America Blood Drive returns to MIS on Sept. 11

The Spirit of America Blood Drive will return to Michigan International Speedway in September, marking 18 years of Michigan residents rolling up their sleeves at this special day-long event to help save lives.

The September 11 blood drive runs from 7 a.m.-7 p.m. at the speedway, located at 12626 US-12 in Brooklyn. Last year nearly 600 people donated blood at the drive, which honors those who lost their lives in the terrorist attacks on the U.S. on September 11, 2001, and emergency responders who answered the call.

Since its inception in 2002, the drive has collected more than 11,301 blood products, helping save the lives of more than 33,903 Michigan residents.

"We are proud to partner with the Versiti Blood Center of Michigan to collect needed blood supplies that will benefit so many in the state," said Michigan International Speedway President Rick Brenner. "As we pause to remember the events of 9/11, we invite people to help to save countless lives by donating blood."

All donors will receive a Spirit of America gift bag and commemorative T-shirt. They may enjoy a complimentary meal in the speedway's Champions Club and a tram ride around the track. Donors may also pay their respects to 9/11 victims and emergency responders at the emotional "Home of the Brave" memorial, a 4,000-square-foot multimedia exhibit featuring videos, presidential letters, magazines, newspapers and more.

Michigan International Speedway will display nearly 3,000 American flags at Unity Field to honor 9/11 victims and

emergency responders. The flags are placed by community volunteers and the Columbia Central High School Honor Society.

"We're coming out of the summer season when our blood supply was dangerously low," said Dawn Kaiser, area vice president and director of donor services at Versiti Blood Center of Michigan. "We need to collect 550 units of blood every day for the nearly 70 hospitals we serve throughout the state. Thanks to our strong partnership with Michigan International Speedway and our generous donors who come out each year to be a beacon of hope for patients in need, we're truly saving lives together."

Appointments to donate blood are required. To schedule an appointment to donate blood, call 1.866.642.5663 or make an appointment at versiti.org/michigan.

Donating blood takes about an hour. Anyone age 17 or older in good health who meets eligibility requirements is encouraged to give. Parental consent is required for donors age 16 to give. Donors should bring a photo ID that includes their birth date.

Versiti Blood Center of Michigan, formerly Michigan Blood, has collected blood throughout the state since 1955. Headquartered in Grand Rapids, the non-profit organization provides blood products and services to nearly 80 Michigan hospitals throughout Michigan and is an established leader in quality and service. Versiti collects more than 114,000 units of blood each year in Michigan at eight donation centers and through the operation of more than 3,400 community blood drives throughout the state.

out for me and my wife."

He enjoys the versatility of being a pastor. "I guess what I really love about the job is the variety in my work," he said. "You could be doing landscaping one day and the next day you're counseling someone, or visiting in a nursing home, or doing Bible study, or worship planning, or sermon writing, or administration." Since arriving in Tecumseh he has been called to conduct two funerals, visited and gave communion to a 92-year-old woman who wanted to sing "Away in the Manger" and knew all the verses, and had a young man in a group home greet him with "Let there be light!"

"I think I want that to be the model for my ministry going forward," said Finn. "Let there be light. It comes back to that amazing privilege and honor of the Christian or pastor to stand in the place of the King and hold out his word of life."

Mayer-Flatt is a graduate of the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary in Columbia, South Carolina and is the seventh full-time pastor at Gloria Dei. She is a native of St. Clair Shores and first earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in theatre and creative writing from Saginaw Valley State University before enrolling in seminary school and becoming ordained six years ago.

Her first call was in Capac, Michigan where she served for almost three years, and she also served a church as associate pastor in Omaha, Nebraska. After spending some time back in St. Clair Shores where she acted as a type of substitute pastor, she was enthusiastic about the opportunity in Tecumseh. "When this interview

process started with Gloria Dei in end of May or early June we really kind of knew that this was going to be a really great fit. We're really glad the congregation decided that, too," she said.

Mayer-Flatt and her husband, Randy, will move into an apartment in Dundee this week and plan to get accustomed to the area for a year before deciding where in Tecumseh they might want to eventually purchase a home.

"I'm really excited to just, first and foremost, get to know the people and get to know the community here," she said, noting that there are many ways the congregation is connected to the schools, the community, the Women and Children's Ministry Center and in many other areas. "I just love being with people and being able to be part of different stories and helping connect where God's story and the worlds' story meet for people," she said.

As a pastor who uses a wheelchair full-time, Mayer-Flatt said the smallest population of disability ministry in the church is people with disabilities serving in leadership. "So I really love being able to help tell that story, help congregations and areas expand their vision for what that looks like, and being able to talk to young people, especially high schoolers and college students of all sorts of abilities, being able to say, 'You know, if I can do it, you can do it, and if God's called me God can call you to do that, too,'" she said. "For folks to be able to see that, whatever it is you're called to do, that's your vocation, that's what you're created for, so to do that and do that well."



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

THS graduate releases new album

For 1993 Tecumseh High School graduate Keith Furstenberg, making music has been part of his life since childhood. He remembers pounding on Tupperware containers along with his siblings during childhood, and music has been a necessary part of his life ever since.

"Music is a great release for me. I grew up in a very musical family," said Furstenberg. "We didn't have a lot of money, but we did have a lot of fun. I always thought Bob Seger was the coolest. We were always pretending we were Bob Seger."

In 1999 after high school, Furstenberg recorded his first CD as part of his band Nooh in Adrian. Twenty years and six CDs later, he found himself back in the studio ready to record.

This time his band Kortokrax was all Furstenberg and the result is the album "The Light Is On."

"This has been at least two or three years in the making. Getting to it was kind of a big process," Furstenberg said. "Recording can be a very difficult process. It takes time and money."

Working with Matt Washburn in Leadbelly Studios in Atlanta didn't make sense

on paper – Washburn primarily works with heavy metal bands – but in the studio it was a perfect match. "I went to check him out and it clicked," said Furstenberg. "He loved my style of music. It's a mixture of rock-and-roll instrumentals and the blues. It's a departure of what I have done before."

One of the big questions people have for Furstenberg is the meaning behind the band name Kortokrax. "It's my great-great-grandmother's name," he said. "Family is important to me. The music is kind of funky and the sound is kind of different and the name is different."

Although there are many instruments, there is only one musician on the album. "I did all the musical parts," said Furstenberg. "A lot of it was played live in the studio. I do all the singing. There are multiple tracks of me singing. It's just me going track by track. It was a very creative piece that I got to have. I am quite proud of this project because I did all of it myself."

Furstenberg has extra material from the album and older pieces so he has enough for a second album. "There's more to come," he said. "When we were recording the album, we ended up with two or three songs that weren't finished. We are now editing for the next project. My goal is to release it in the first part of January 2020."

With his day job, touring for the album isn't really a possibility. "This is my twenty-first year of teaching. I teach in Cherokee County in Georgia. I teach phys ed and I teach reading," said Furstenberg. "I went to Patterson Elementary. My school is very similar to Patterson. It's a tiny school. I wear many many hats."

Although teaching doesn't leave much time available for playing "The Light Is On" live, Furstenberg hopes that he can connect his music with Hollywood instead. "I would love to have my music featured in independent films," he said. "A lot of the album is conceptualized for a soundtrack."

His hopes were realized in 2001 when his song, "Washed Away" was used in "One: The Movie." With this album available for streaming on Spotify, Google Play, Amazon, Apple Music, Furstenberg hopes his music will reach the ears of the right person. "I've had a little bit of luck with that locally in advertisements," said Furstenberg.

The song "Grow or Go" has received airplay in the United Kingdom. "I've been getting a lot of British feedback," Furstenberg said. "It made me feel very international."

Through it all, Furstenberg remembers his Tecumseh roots and appreciates all the support he has received from family and friends in the area. "I love Tecumseh," he said.

On August 14, the Tecumseh High School Class of 1954 held its 65th reunion at the home of Lyle DeJonghe near Ridgeway, where a lunch was provided by Lyle and Charlotte Wood. The class of 1954 was the first class to complete their entire high school years, ninth through 12th grades, at the then new high school just east of the athletic field. Audition call for the TCA Nutcracker Ballet

Tecumseh Center for the Arts (TCA) will conduct Nutcracker Ballet auditions on Sunday, Sept. 8 for the 15th production of the timeless tale at the TCA.

This year's Nutcracker Ballet will take place December 12-14 and will consist of two casts. All casting decisions will be determined by the Nutcracker Ballet Production Team, and each dancer will be reviewed by a panel of five area dance studio owners, choreographers, and the producer. Cast members are chosen by how they perform at the time of auditions, based on

ability, stage presence, and skill level. The panel reviews individual scores and jointly decides casting.

Audition times are broken down into age groups. Those ages eight to 10 should arrive at noon for 1 p.m. auditions; ages 11-13 are to arrive at 1:15 p.m. for 2:15 p.m. auditions; and ages 14 and older should arrive at 2:30 p.m. for 3:30 p.m. auditions. Dancers must be the minimum age of eight years old by November 15, and no older than a senior in high school. During the hour prior to audition time,

dancers will have fittings and cast photos. All dancers must wear pink tights, a black or blue leotard, ballet shoes or pointe shoes, have their hair in a bun and wear absolutely no jewelry.

All dancers must enter through the Green Room located in the back of the theater from the south parking lot. No parents are allowed beyond the check in point. After the audition process is complete, dancers can be picked up at the front entrance. Parents are welcome to wait in the lobby, but will not be permitted beyond that point.

Mandatory requirements for all dancers include a mandatory parent meeting on Thursday, Sept. 26 at 7 p.m.; attendance at all Sunday rehearsals in October; dancers must be currently enrolled in a ballet or pointe class at any studio; and only one absence will be allowed during November and December.

New this year, dancers can pre-register for auditions through the TCA's website at thetca.org by clicking on the "Buy Tickets" tab and then "Register Now" next to Nutcracker Ballet Auditions.

'Education remains a top priority'

As another school year begins, it's a good time to remind our students about the importance of receiving a quality education to having a long and rewarding career.

Having him in my office with his knowledge of the district and the legislative process will be a real benefit to the residents of the 17th Senate District.

Board approves new math curriculum

what we could do to fix it," he said. He suggested they come up with an idea and present it to him.

Compass Learning Center math teacher Kristin Hess and high school pre-calculus and calculus teacher Will Ramsell utilized a PowerPoint presentation outlining the aspects of a supplemental web-based math program called ALEKS, which stands for Assessment and LEarning in Knowledge Spaces, that they said has generated much excitement and enthusiasm among the group of nine math teachers who have been meeting weekly to improve TPS math instruction. West STEAM Center teacher Jan Garner, who was instrumental in discovering the benefits of ALEKS, was unable to attend the meeting.

Ramsell began the presentation with a movie quote. "At the heart of every legend there is truth. A few souls unite to save their world. We can be heroes in our own lives, every one of us, if we only have the courage to try. Our fates were always intertwined, but now our worlds are joined as one. We need to repair our planets, work together if we wish to survive," he said, reading words by the character Optimus Prime from the "Transformers" film series.

"When I think of a few souls, that's us, and saving their worlds — that is our classroom," Ramsell said.

"Teaching is our world. We are very passionate with what we do." He went on to say that his high school students can't be successful unless they are also successful in previous math classes from sixth grade through high school.

He said the objective is to return to teacher-driven curriculum, which was abandoned during the previous two years. "We want teacher-driven curriculum," he said. "That voice that we once had to be trusted to make decisions regarding our curriculum, and continue the trust that you have with us to do what is best for all students district-wide, sixth through 11th grade."

Hess said the meetings between math teachers involved researching various possibilities and options. She said they have the resources to use textbook-based common core curriculum for sixth grade through algebra II for the 2019-20 school year, and want to implement a supplemental program to ensure consistency in math instruction.

Hess and Ramsell promoted the benefits of switching to a McGraw-Hill curriculum that would allow students to have math workbooks they would be able to keep. Paired together, the ALEKS program would be able to assess when a student is ready to move on to another level of math learning, and the McGraw-Hill

Reveal curriculum would use the same consistent language throughout the grades to help achieve the district and building-wide school improvement plans for math curriculum. "We feel that the consistency of the curriculum and the supplemental program would also benefit our students," Hess said, adding that as a parent of two children in the district, "I can't tell you how excited I was, not only for my students, but that my kids could get to use this."

Ramsell said he felt it was necessary to point out how they got to the point of the presentation. "In the 2017-2018 school year, some of us met with (then-director of learning) Stacy Bailey monthly to start having math conversations as a district. The purpose of these meetings was to create consistency throughout the district," he said, stating that decisions were made about the current curriculum, Engage New York, from the top down at the administration level, and not the bottom up, teacher driven. He pointed out that when a teacher asked if other curriculum options could be considered, they were told no.

Beginning in September 2018 Ramsell and his colleagues struggled with Engage New York, and in January 2019 he made the decision to create a separate email account to communicate with newly elected

Board President Tim Simpson to express his thoughts about the district's math issues. "I was fearful of someone getting an email that I was going to send out, and ultimately using it against anyone they could," he said. "That was the environment many of us lived. I lived that, and I'm being honest, that is what we went through. I'm happy to say that is not the case anymore, or we would not be standing here right now giving you this presentation."

Ramsell said he asked Simpson to keep the communication confidential and look into ending Engage New York. "Mr. Simpson, you have no idea how grateful (we are) that you listened to our concerns. You were giving voice back to our teachers," he said.

"Working with Kristin Hess and Jan Garner and everyone else who could make it, this is what drives great schools. A functioning team has players playing their part in a sport they love and have say in. We need more of that," Ramsell concluded.

After the presentation, the board asked several questions of Hess and Ramsell and moved to add to the action items the approval of up to \$20,000 to purchase the McGraw-Hill Reveal Curriculum and the ALEKS supplemental program for a one-year trial, then voted unanimously to approve the purchase.

SmartZone awarded grant from state

The grant will be used in Tecumseh to help market and ready the Business and Technology Campus on M-50, east of Kirchhoff Automotive.

The breakdown of the project funded by the grant, according to the project description, as provided by the city, includes, in part:

- Feasibility study - \$25,000 — To engage a specialist to conduct an in-depth study to determine what our target industries should be for these sites.
- Talent profile - \$20,000 — The SmartZone would engage a specialist and utilize data from the Workforce Intelligence Network to generate a talent profile specific to our area. This would help in marketing generally but will also help to identify strengths and gaps in our regional workforce and training/education programs.
- Marketing materials/high resolution photos and videos, \$15,000 (including a \$10,000 cash match) — Utilizing the results of the feasibility study and talent profile, the SmartZone will have customized marketing materials created to increase visibility and competitiveness in attraction efforts.
- Website - \$15,000 — Site selectors typically search the web for information about the area before initial contact. Currently there is little to no web presence for the SmartZone or the properties within, including the Business and Technology Campus.
- Administration - \$10,000 (in-kind match): This funding will be allocated for administrative activities needed to manage the project over the two-year timeline and beyond.

Commissioners OK Subdivision Plans North of Burt Street

Plans for a new subdivision north of Burt St. were given the green light by the city Planning Commission Monday night.

In a unanimous vote, the Commission recommended that a 15-acre site, as requested by Ernest Oliver and Joseph Conklin, be re-zoned for multiple family housing.

The request will be forwarded to Council at next Tuesday's meeting.

Several months ago, a similar proposal was submitted, but found to be not sufficiently advanced and the Commission turned it down, making several suggestions for its improvement.

Members pointed out that all

their requests had been covered in the new proposal, and Merlyn Downing expressed the Commission's sentiments with, "it's an extremely good job."

Plans encompass a 46-acre parcel of land between Burt St. and Macon Hwy. and are scheduled to be developed in three stages. This area will ultimately include 70 single-family residences priced around \$25,000, and multiple housing for 218 families.

Playgrounds, tennis courts, game fields, and open spaces will be plentiful and are to be developed in the initial stage. Richard Eggleston remarked that the eight and one-half acres of open land was "more than we

usually get."

Oliver said that with immediate approval, work could begin on phase one this fall, with 68 units being completed possibly in two years. This section will include both single and multiple family construction and was called "a good, nice development in itself."

In addition to the recreational facilities, the Commission was impressed with the central location of the multiple housing within the subdivision and the circular flow of traffic throughout.

Planners Dr. Robert Darvas and Steve Janeck, of Ann Arbor, presented the blueprints and pointed out that Clark St. could be carried through to Ma-

con Hwy., thus giving the area a more than adequate accessibility.

City Manager Cal Zorn noted that it was probably the only possible, through street in the area and may prove to be helpful in installing a proposed water main.

However, Zorn also pointed out that the proposal "involves spot zoning" and expressed his opinion that it was "not a planned neighborhood development."

Plans now call for a 21-acre section to be developed in phase one, more building and completion of all street facilities in phase two at a later date, and a continuance of phase three building soon thereafter.

a Board of Appeals meeting on Jan. 19, 1966. Officials have indicated by letter to the city that they will shelve their expansion plans here and develop at plant locations in other cities.

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Charles and Virginia Hickman Hospital

New hospital to feature light, alternative healing



Progress is being made on the construction of the new Hickman Hospital on M-52.

More than two years after the groundbreaking for Lenawee County's new ProMedica Charles and Virginia Hickman Hospital, construction of the building is progressing on schedule as are plans to serve the first patients in September 2020.

Located on the former site of Mission Point Golf Course, the 220,000-square-foot campus on M-52 is centrally located to provide access for residents in Lenawee County and surrounding communities. Dr. Julie Yaroch, president of ProMedica Bixby and Herrick Hospitals, conducted a tour for the press on Thursday, Aug. 22.

"This isn't just about us making the right treatment plan and giving you the right medicines, doing the right surgeries, but it's also looking at alternative ways of healing, so bringing nature into the scheme as well as art," Yaroch said during the tour of the partially constructed building. She said there is an art team working on where to place art and

there will be more windows to bring in light and contribute to patient healing, as well as green space visible from patient rooms.

When completed, the hospital set to replace Tecumseh's Herrick Hospital and Adrian's Bixby Hospital will cover 205,000 square feet, hold 58 acute care beds, four operating rooms and three minor procedure rooms, a cardiac rehabilitation unit and sleep clinic, intensive care and a step-down unit, outpatient cardiovascular, pulmonary and neurology clinics, diagnostic imaging services, and more.

From the front entrance of the hospital, the south side of the first floor of the building will hold emergency services and the north end will house supportive services. A central registration area will serve all patients, whether they arrive for testing or surgery. Acute care services will be housed in the central region of the main floor and also on the second level. A separate women's health center will be located

near the radiology department on the first floor.

Yaroch said the new hospital will place much more emphasis on security for staff, patient and community safety. "Right now you can walk through many of our service lines without anyone stopping you. On the new campus we'll have a lot more checkpoints where you'll have to have a badge swiped to get in or you'll have to have a key code, or someone will have to let you in. The patient can't just wander through the patient care area, so that's for their own safety but also our staff's safety," she said.

There will be two entrances for the emergency department, one bay for emergency vehicles and one for private vehicles. The department will have 26 beds, four of which will be designated for mental health and will have more safety features. A separate room for sexual assault victims will ensure the privacy of patients. An elevator from the emergency department directly to the operating room, critical care, and labor and delivery units will make for faster patient transport.

The Hickman Hospital will have less beds than are currently provided at Herrick and Bixby hospitals, and all of the patient rooms will be single private units. "We don't need the same number of beds," Yaroch said. "We don't keep patients for as long as we used to keep them."

It is expected that the new facility will employ 698 employees. Yaroch said the goal is to retain all of the jobs currently held in both the Tecumseh and Adrian hospitals. "We feel we've

right-sized that team and our current footprint so we can move everybody on to this campus," she said.

Already on site, ProMedica Farms, located on three acres bordered by M-52 and Shepherd Road, includes several barns, walking paths, and a hoop house for indoor growing, part of ProMedica's effort to encourage healthy eating and preventative care. The farm produces food for the traveling Veggie Mobile as well as providing an alternative rehabilitation site for patients. The hospital's campus will include two and a half miles of walking trails, potential future retail opportunities and senior care and living options as well as holding a site for a future medical office building and oncology services.

A groundbreaking was recently held for a wellness building that will hold the YMCA of Lenawee County and all of the hospital rehabilitation services such as physical, speech and occupational therapies. In addition, a boundless playground will be constructed where children with and without disabilities can learn together through play.

Fundraising is ongoing to raise the final \$4.5 million of the \$143 million project. A major portion of the funds, \$125 million, came from ProMedica operating and foundation funds, and \$13.5 million has been raised through community donations so far.

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

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ORDINANCE ADDRESSING FLOOD-PLAIN MANAGEMENT PROVISIONS OF THE STATE CONSTRUCTION CODE

Community Name: Tecumseh Township, County: Lenawee
Ordinance number 2019-3
 An Ordinance to Designate an enforcing agency to discharge the responsibility of the Township of Tecumseh located in Lenawee County, and to designate regulated flood hazard areas under the provisions of the State Construction Code Act, Act No. 230 of the Public Acts of 1972, as amended.

Section 1. AGENCY DESIGNATED.
 Pursuant to the provisions of the state construction code, in accordance with Section 8b(6) of Act 230, of the Public Acts of 1972, as amended, the Building Official of the Township of Raisin is hereby designated as the enforcing agency to discharge the responsibility of the Township of Tecumseh under Act 230, of the Public Acts of 1972, as amended, State of Michigan. The Township of Tecumseh assumes responsibility for the administration and enforcement of said Act through out the corporate limits of the community adopting this ordinance.

Section 2. CODE APPENDIX ENFORCED.


