Donations sought for North Evans Street wreath project



OMAHA BEACH

'A LONG THIN LINE OF PERSONAL ANGUISH'

Seventy-five years ago my grandfather ran across a beach. On a grand scale, this act would impact the course of history. On a minute scale this act would impact the world view of a child yet unborn. Me.

My grandfather, Ralph Sytsma, was among the second wave of soldiers to land on Omaha Beach on D-Day. This was all I knew, and as a child it meant very little to me. My grandfather never spoke of the war. I had a vague understanding of what it was. I knew the word "holocaust," yet it was just a word — a two-dimensional piece of history far from my life in a little Michigan farming community. I knew to be proud of his service, but what that service was or meant or cost, I did not grasp.


When I was in middle school, my grandfather became very sick with cancer and was given a short time to live. I would come to understand that this prognosis was not the first time he had stared at death on the horizon.

My grandfather was charming and funny, and not one you would imagine to be weighted down by the trauma of war. Yet my mom remembers how he would retreat to the quiet of his fields, spending hours alone in silence and remaining silent about what he had seen and what he had

walked through. Yet, with the end of his life approaching, the time for silence had ended. He suddenly seemed to have an urgency for us to know, for his family to understand. So we all gathered, his children and grandchildren, his siblings, and nieces and nephews. We all boarded a plane to Europe to retrace with him his steps from the war.

When we arrived at Normandy, we walked among the thousands of white crosses. We stood near the concrete fortresses from which the Germans had fired upon my grandfather. We stood on the bluffs and overlooked the ocean. We walked the beaches, walked across the sand and near the water that on that long ago day had gone red with the blood of the fallen. A few days after the battle, war writer Ernie Pyle walked the beach calling it "a long thin line of personal anguish." "It extends in a thin little line, just like a high-water mark for miles along the beach," he wrote. "This is the strewn personal gear, gear that will never be needed again, of those who fought and died to give us our entrance into Europe. Here in a jumbled row for mile on mile are soldiers' packs. Here are socks and shoe polish, sewing kits, diaries, Bibles and hand grenades. Here are the latest letters from home, with the address on each one neatly razored out — one of the security precautions enforced before the boys embarked. Here are toothbrushes and razors, and snapshots of families back home staring up at you from the sand. Here are pocketbooks, metal mirrors, extra trousers, and

Road millage receives two-to-one support

In spite of a low voter turnout Tuesday, Nov. 5, Tecumseh residents approved a bond proposal to repair city streets with 667 yes and 319 no votes. Only 14.97% of 6,687 registered Tecumseh voters made it to the polls or took advantage of absentee ballots, according to unofficial results provided by the Lenawee County election results page electionlenawee.com. The results will be official once the Board of State Canvassers certifies the election.

The bond proposal language read, "Shall the City of Tecumseh, Lenawee County, Michigan, borrow the principal sum

of not to exceed Two Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) and issue its general obligation unlimited tax bonds payable over a period not to exceed five years and six months from date of issuance, to be used by the City for the purpose of paying the cost of install-

'Zero-depth' entry to be feature at new YMCA pool

The new YMCA being built on the campus of the ProMedica Charles and Virginia Hickman Hospital will allow the facility to improve services for members and better serve the community, part of a collaborative agreement between the nonprofit organization and ProMedica Health System to create a health-focused partnership. Located on M-52 between Tecumseh and Adrian, the YMCA is expected to be finished in the fourth quarter of 2020, in line with the opening of the hospital.

The new multi-purpose, \$12 million shared facility will offer an approximately 35,000 square-foot full-service branch for county residents to utilize. Along with the amenities of the building, outdoor space at the site will allow youth programming through summer camps, outdoor wellness and learning programs through the previously

established ProMedica Farms. It will be multi-generational with programming for residents of all ages and interests.

The Lenawee YMCA's interim director is Jason Trame, district vice president of the YMCA of Greater Toledo, which encompasses the current Adrian location.

Trame said the current YMCA building on West Maumee Street in Adrian is around 50,000 square feet, which includes unused space such as racquetball courts. "Those don't get a lot of use," he said. The new building will have a boot-shaped, zero-depth-entry, family leisure pool. "Zero-depth-entry means you're basically walking into the water more like a beach," he said. "It's a lot more friendly for kids and even seniors that struggle walking. And it will be warm water, so it can be used for therapy and things like that."

Popular Kiwanis Club nut sale returns

Every November a group of local volunteers gets nutty, but it's for a good cause. The annual nut sale put on by the Kiwanis Club of Tecumseh raises funds to benefit the community, with a goal of selling 300 cases, or 1,800 cans, of nuts.

For a mere \$20, Kiwanis supporters can buy a 36-ounce can of sea-salted almonds, cashews, hazelnuts and pecans, and in the process help children and others in the Tecumseh area. For those who want to gift and mail the protein-packed snacks, the club has heavy cardboard gift boxes for \$1 that are sturdy enough for gifting or mailing nutty surprises.

The club raises more than \$6,500 each year through their nut sales. While the company that supplies the nuts raised

their wholesale price by \$4 per case a couple of years ago, causing the club's profits to decrease, Kiwanians kept the price the same as it has been for years. The sale remains one of their major moneymakers for the year.

The club also raises funds through the Kiwanis Flag Project by selling \$35 yearly subscriptions that provide delivery of U.S. flags displayed in the yards of area residents a few days before and after Memorial Day, Flag Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, 9/11 and Veteran's Day. Their Kiwanis Travel and Adventure Series, held from October through April at the Tecumseh Center for the Arts, offers viewers a glimpse of far away travels for a \$5 ticket. In addition, Kiwanis Club members will take over bell ringing for the Salvation Army on a Saturday in Decem-

ber at all the donation locations in Tecumseh for the entire day.

Kiwanis members distribute dictionaries to third grade students in Tecumseh Public Schools, just one of the club's programs that reaches out to children in the community. They also provide college scholarships, summer reading programs, contributions to hospice support, and holiday parties for children with special needs, donate diapers to Care Pregnancy Center in Adrian, and more. They sponsor service leadership programs, with the Builders Club for Tecumseh Public Schools' 7th and 8th grade students and the Key Club at Tecumseh High School. The club's four major committees include Community Service, Youth Service, Young Children Priority One, and Human and Spiritual Values.

The Kiwanis Club of Te-

cumseh shares the Kiwanis International goal of "changing the world one child and one community at a time." To support the club, residents can purchase the gourmet nuts at Schmidt and Sons Pharmacy, Jerry's Market, Martin's Home Center, British Tea Garden, Dr. Calvin Tuttle's office, TLC Community Credit Union, Old National Bank and First Federal Bank. The local club, which is celebrating its 63rd year of existence, welcomes visitors at their meetings held at Tecumseh United Methodist Church, 605 Bishop Reed Dr., from 7 until 8 a.m. each Tuesday. Johnnie's Bar and Grill comes to Clinton

The closing of Dan's Bar in downtown Clinton was a perfect opportunity for John "Johnnie" DeAngelis to bring Johnnie's Bar and Grill North to Clinton after his success with Johnnie's Bar and Grill in Onsted. A building inspector in Lincoln Park by day, DeAngelis' real passion is providing food, drink and opportunity to communities.

A Clinton resident since 2000, DeAngelis has been in the bar and grill business since 2008. Johnnie's Bar and Grill in Onsted helped to revitalize the village's downtown business.

His hope is that his purchase of the old Dan's Bar and the Captain's Lounge in downtown will help stabilize the community in Clinton. Johnnie's Bar and Grill North opened the Thursday before the 2019 Clinton Fall Festival.

The Captain's Lounge will eventually reopen as Johnnie's Bar and Grill South within the next six months to a year. Until that time, it will continue to be The Cap-

tain's Lounge. For both locations, DeAngelis plans extensive renovations and expansions to the buildings as well as adding outside seating.

Johnnie's Bar and Grill North's focus is on creating a relaxed environment for dinner. Johnnie's Bar and Grill South will cater to people interested in games and have a more traditional bar atmosphere.

Despite only being open for a short time, DeAngelis is pleased with the community's reception of Johnny's Bar and Grill North. The location will have its full menu available on November 15.

"We have more than just bar food," he said. "It's a place that you can wear a suit or come in your jeans and feel comfortable. It's been very successful in Onsted. I have a good staff. We have had a lot of good feedback."

DeAngelis believes for small towns it is important to have good places for people to go to eat, drink and socialize. He has observed traditional retail of past generations is not something that draws people, especially young people, to downtowns.

"You try to adapt to what the community is," said DeAngelis. "The thing I do is listen. All I do is provide a need that so many are crying out for. Food brings people. All I'm trying to do in my little way is provide a great meal for a reasonable price that anyone can enjoy."

The restaurant will soon offer delivery and online ordering to make it easier for busy families in the community.

In Onsted, it's been natural for DeAngelis to support the community by donating and supporting local causes and activities. He expects to be just as involved in the Clinton community and looks forward to providing what people want in a restaurant and need from a local business.

"You have to love the business to be in the bar business," DeAngelis said. "I love it! I love the people I meet — even the people who complain. I appreciate their feedback."

"We'll have a larger wellness center, larger gymnasium," he said. "All the fitness equipment will be new, so we'll be able to have state-of-the-art fitness equipment. We'll have Kid Zone space for babysitting while people are working out." The new YMCA will also have family locker rooms.

Classes offered will include swim and water exercise classes as well as group exercise classes such as cycling, zumba, cardio drumming and more. Trame said Pro-Medica plans to have rehabilitation services in the facility, which can help those undergoing a rehabilitation program to transition

to recreational exercise when their program is complete.

YMCA officials have just started discussing what the membership fees will be for the new facility. Trame said they expect to transition current staff to the new building, and with an anticipation of increased membership, will likely hire additional staff members.

While there have been concerns about accessibility to the rural site, he said a group is discussing transportation and is working on options for that.

The YMCA board is in conversation with

a few different entities that are interested in the current YMCA building in Adrian, according to Trame. "The board is very committed to making sure that this property goes to somebody that's able to maintain it and be a good steward of the property for the community. They're very committed to making sure we don't have an empty building sitting here on Maumee Street," he said.

Although it's still a year away from opening, Trame said it's exciting to see what the new building will offer. "I think it's going to be a great thing for the community," he said.

Holiday Wine Fest set for Carnegie Preservation League

An evening of wine, food and music will benefit the Tecumseh Carnegie Preservation League for the ninth year with funds earmarked for upkeep and improvements of the historic Carnegie Library now reincarnated as Carnegie Studios, a creative space for local artists and craftspeople. The annual Holiday Wine Fest on Sunday, Nov. 10 at Evans Street Station is hosted by the restaurant and the league and will feature wine tasting and much more from 5-8 p.m.

"It's all about the wine tasting and the wonderful people in our community!" said Beth Kennedy of Evans Street Station. "There are six wine stations headed up by our generous distributors with wares from around the world." The restaurant's chefs will provide a variety of hors d'oeuvres and treats, and local band One Hit Wonders has volunteered to provide live music. Kennedy said a silent auction will round out the evening.

Retail sales on wine will be offered, with generous discounts on case purchases, and attendees who turn in their ticket stub will have a chance to win a \$50 gift certificate toward their wine purchase.

Last year's Wine Fest raised around \$3,000, said Kennedy, and almost \$60,000 has been contributed through the event over the years.

The historic structure was built as the Carnegie Library in February 1905 and served in that

capacity until 1962, when the new library building was constructed on North Ottawa Street. Nine years ago the nonprofit Tecumseh Carnegie Preservation League was established by a group of residents committed to save the historic building, led by Evans Street Station owner Dick Johnson. Formerly used by Tecumseh Public Schools as administrative offices and then as storage space until the property was sold to attorney Gary Baldwin in 2002, the building was vacant for many years before the league bought it in 2010. As Carnegie Studios, the former library now contains nine studios for local artists.

According to Kennedy, in recent years the downstairs was turned into studio space, and other funds raised have been used for general maintenance of the building, repair for water damage, and roof repairs. "The committee is saving up for a new roof and we also have wish list items such as the ability to make the entire building ADA accessible and add a bathroom on the lower level," she said. "These items will require funds from fundraising." The league will continue to raise funds through events like Wine Fest, from donations, and by applying for additional grant funding.

Veterans Day honors all of those who have served the country in war or peace. It was originally called Armistice Day to commemorate when the Allies and Germany effected an armistice on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, which signaled the end of fighting during World War I. Congress officially recognized the day in 1926, and in 1938 it became an official holiday set aside to honor veterans of that war.

After World War II and the Korean War and at the urging of veterans service organizations, Congress amended the commemoration on June 1, 1954 by changing the word "armistice" to "veterans" so the day would honor American veterans of all wars.

Local events are planned in the Tec-

cumseh area to observe Veterans Day, including a free community concert in honor of local veterans and their families at the Tecumseh Center for the Arts, 400 N. Maumee St., on Sunday, Nov. 10. Grandfather returns to Normandy with family

bloody, abandoned shoes."

The thing I remember most about that day at Normandy was my funny and charming grandfather's retreat into silence. I was young, but I knew not to speak. Even the young can sense pain. We stood together on the bluffs overlooking where death had stared at him and he had stared at so much death. Standing there was my first understanding that for soldiers, war does not dissipate in an act of bravery nor does it disappear at mission's end. Standing next to my grandfather, I saw for the first time that the sacrifice of a soldier is not simply a moment, but rather it is a long line that can extend into a lifetime.

In the days that followed, I still had the unanswered question of why. Why fight at all? Why run into the depths of hell? Then, my grandfather brought us to Dachau, the site of a former concentration camp. There, I understood. There, walking through the camp, I was given a glimpse of evil unopposed, unstopped, and unchecked. We walked by the crematoriums, stood within the gas chambers, and paused in rever-

ence before the mass graves. I looked at the pictures and read the stories. There, in that place, evil could not be mistaken for an idea or a myth or simply a metaphor or all the whitewashed ways we push it from view. There was nothing whitewashed about this place where the Nazis had carried out the torture and systematic extermination of men, women, and children. Children.

My grandfather died a short time after that trip. Yet his legacy to me, his dying lesson that I received from that trip was that there are things worth fighting for. I do not mean this in a flip or cliché way. This was a lesson given by someone who understood the cost of that belief. While I have never fought in battle, and while I will never fully understand what it means to carry out such actions or to carry the sacrifice of war, standing next to my grandpa on that beach did help me to see that battles do not end on the beaches. They are carried on within the soldiers themselves, a long thin line of anguish. And yet, despite the horrors of what he had seen, despite crawl-

ing through hell and having to carry it for the rest of his life, when it came to the end of his life, when death once again appeared on the horizon, he still believed that there were reasons to run across that beach.

As a young man, my grandfather had the courage to run across a beach. On a grand scale, he helped change the course of history. As an old man, my grandfather had the courage to tell his family what had happened to him on that long ago day. His story forever changed me and the way I gaze out onto the world. He changed the way I understand the sacrifice of those who cross into battle. He helped me to see that there are things worth fighting for. He taught me that despite fear and insurmountable opposition, there will be moments in life when one can no longer look the other way. There will be moments when courage is needed. There will be moments when one must run across a beach.

ing, improving, replacing, and reconstructing streets in the city, including necessary rights-of-way and appurtenances and attachments thereto? The estimated millage to be levied in 2020 is 1.9804 mills (\$1.9804 per \$1,000 of taxable value) and the estimated simple average annual millage rate required to retire the bonds is 1.9800 mills (\$1.9800 per \$1,000 of taxable value.)

The millage will cost an average of \$120 annually based on the true cash property value of a Tecumseh residence worth \$120,800, for example.

All three incumbent city council members on the ballot ran unopposed and were reelected. Gary Naugle, Vicki Riddle and Austin See each won an additional two-year term on council.

In the first city election with both Precinct 1 and Precinct 2 voting at the AJ Smith Recreation Center, City Clerk Tonya Miller said the process ran smoothly, although she did have a few people call city hall to check on where they were to vote. "It went really well," she said. "It was a little more streamlined."

Where Has Money Gone?

Where's the money?
This question was raised by the city attorney James Beardsley at Council meeting Monday night when he reported that Tecumseh was not receiving enough revenue from penal fines and costs from District Court in Adrian.

He reported that revenue for the first nine months of 1969 was \$3,772, just 23.4% of the amount received during the same period in 1968 when the Justice of Peace system was used.

He said the net known loss to date is \$12,335.57, and Adrian's loss amounts to \$34,175.13

Mr. Beardsley, who sought and gained Council's approval to employ city auditors for lo-

cating the lost funds, said that he interviewed personnel at District Court, county clerk's office and personnel at the treasurer's office without significant result.

He said further data was to be supplied to him from these offices and also from local police chief, Murell Clark; however, "believe we will need actual audit of all penal fines and costs paid on complaints and tickets originating from this municipality."

Mr. Beardsley felt that one auditor could provide the necessary answers in a couple of days.

While most of his concern was officially presented to Council via letter, he discussed with officials the loss of mon-

ies from fines and costs, the incurred expenses to the city of cases in District Court requiring counsel from Greg Forsthoefel, attorney, in Mr. Beardsley's office, and the need for the local magistrate, Ernest Oliver, to handle more tickets and complaints in Tecumseh.

He pointed out that Mr. Forsthoefel often makes two or three trips a day to District Court, and local police officers, on or off duty, are often required to attend sessions at the Adrian court.

Chief Clark questioned the final disposition of tickets and said his department often does not receive necessary information for its files.

Knappe finished the 5K course in 19:17 — just 15 seconds short of the top 30 and all-state honors. Kaylee Presta finished in 19:51;


Chesney Wilke, 19:54; Isabelle Brigman, 20:46; and Kelsey Knappe finished in 20:54 for Tecumseh.
