

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## Ministry brings shelter to women and children three months after opening

Tecumseh is 'a neighbor of hope to us in so many ways'

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The Neighbors of Hope (NOH) Women's and Children's Ministry Center located at 502 E. Pottawatamie St. officially opened with a ribbon cutting August 13, and in just three months the transitional housing program has been actively changing the lives of the women and children residing there.

NOH Executive Director Steven Palmer received the keys to the building in October 2018 and the process of renovation began, after years of planning, seeking an optimal location, discussion with ProMedica about acquiring the former Herrick Manor nursing home, hashing out

concerns with Tecumseh City Council, overwhelming public support, and finally beginning the steps to make the vacant building a home for women, with or without children, who need a safe space and a new start.

"The women who are currently enrolled in our Fresh Start Program express on a daily basis how blessed and thankful they are to have somewhere to stay in their time of transition," Director Cass Hollenbeck said. "We have gone through some transitions ourselves with the personal decision of Dee Crane to step down as director after being instrumental in successfully launching the program, to becoming a ministry partner who is engaged on a regular basis and who recently accompanied a mom in the delivery room and welcomed our youngest

## Kiwanis Club members install 'Little Free Library' at Bird Park

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You may have seen the small structures on poles, little house-shaped boxes with windowed doors that contain books, placed in communities across the country. These "Little Free Library" stations are meant to promote reading, and the newest such item was installed at Douglas W. Bird Kiwanis Park on October 19 by Kiwanis Club of Tecumseh members Chuck Gehrke and Ron Publiski.

Little Free Library is a nonprofit organization that inspires a love of reading, builds community, and sparks creativity by fostering neighborhood book exchanges around the world, according to littlefreelibrary.org. Those in communities where there are "libraries" are encouraged to take a book or leave a book inside the boxes.

## Board meeting reveals financial good news for Tecumseh Schools

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The snowstorm that clogged streets and roadways contributed to sparse attendance at an abbreviated meeting of the Tecumseh Public Schools Board of Education Monday night, which addressed financial good news, the cost of purchasing a 12-passenger van versus having student transportation company First Student provide vans, and the process of seeking bids for custodial services.

Superintendent Rick Hilderley said he told building principals and business manager Nikki Reinhardt that if they didn't have an item on the meeting agenda, they should go home in-

stead of braving the weather. He met with Reinhardt to be briefed on the finance report and shared that information with the board.

Hilderley reported that the cost to own a 12-passenger van, which would be used to transport small groups of athletes to sporting events when a full-size bus is unnecessary, would be \$66,692 over a span of five years, which includes the purchase price of a new van, insurance, maintenance, repairs, taxes and fees.

The savings per year, over using a full-size bus for the same transportation, would be \$20,145, or a total of \$100,725 for the five-year period. "What

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## Inner Space

The bright colored lights, red and green decorations, and store ads enticing us to shop for that perfect gift are here, with Halloween barely over and Thanksgiving plans just forming.

In some homes Christmas trees have appeared, extending the holiday cheer a few more weeks. A recent study said people who start Christmas decorating early are happier in general. Perhaps that's due to their childlike glee surrounding the holiday. I vote for happiness, always.

But some people have a harder time around the holidays, and the visions of loving families and friend-filled gatherings are reminders of what they're missing. People with support systems have it good. There is no such thing as a perfect holiday, but I think it's good to count your blessings.

I won't be able to see my sons for Thanksgiving or Christmas this year, and I have no plans for Thanksgiving Day. I asked one of my Facebook groups for advice on how to spend the holiday and socialize and got many suggestions. Volunteering to serve food at a free Thanksgiving dinner or visiting senior homes were on the list. I know that helping others is a good way to focus on those with more pressing needs, so I will consider that as well as planning a Friendsgiving gathering.

There are many people with more pressing needs. Governor Gretchen Whitmer recently proclaimed November as Homeless Awareness Month. More than 65,000 citizens throughout Michigan experienced homelessness in 2018, and the number of families who are affected by homelessness or are at risk of having inadequate or unstable housing continues to be a significant community issue.

In total, 11,317 households with children were homeless in 2018, and 8,367 Michigan residents aged 55 and above experienced homelessness, an increase of 5% from 2016 to 2018.

I have a stable, warm home and wonderful neighbors in a neighborhood that's been mine for more than 20 years. I'm counting my blessings.

According to feedingamerica.org, in Michigan 1,369,250 people are struggling with hunger, and 345,130 of them are chil-

dren. People facing hunger in Michigan are estimated to need \$652,838,000 more per year to meet their food needs. The average cost of a meal in Lenawee County is \$2.70, according to the 2019 Map the Meal Gap study. That is what it would cost to feed one person one meal made at home. That's not much to provide a high-quality, healthy meal.

Food insecurity refers to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's measure of a lack of access to enough food for an active, healthy life for all household members, and limited or uncertain availability of nutritionally adequate foods. Sometimes families who are food insecure have to make hard decisions between paying for their basic needs such as housing or medical bills, and buying healthy food. Feeding America's 2017 data shows that 10.9% of Lenawee County residents are food insecure.

I have the funds to buy healthy food in adequate quantities, and to have a variety of food to meet my nutritional needs. While I had a challenging food budget during the years I raised my sons, I have never gone hungry. I am counting my blessings.

Those lacking adequate food and shelter can be helped by local efforts, such as the dinners at God's Bread Basket at Tecumseh Church of Christ or at Tipton Community Church; the Christmas food boxes and gifts from the Tecumseh Service Club; and the assistance for women and children at Neighbors of Hope's Women and Children's Ministry Center.

Fixing hunger and homelessness is important, and we can donate food or funds and support the places that address homelessness. Also important is reaching out to those who are lonely. Sadness is a far too frequent affliction, and many people suffer their loneliness silently in order to appear fine and not be a burden to others. That's like pretending your arm's not broken because you don't want to appear weak — and that trick never works.

For those with aching hearts this holiday season, the only remedy is compassion and friendship. We need to reach out to get past surface needs, warming others with kindness and care.

## Downtown prepares for open house

Visitors will be invited to vote for their favorite "Who-ville" window decorations in a friendly competition between merchants, as well as explore each store for the "Find the Grinch Scavenger Hunt" activity. Rhonda Nowak, chair of the Holiday Open House committee and owner of Great Ideas, said this year's event is expanded and has quite a few merchants participating. "There's 33 this year, which is one of the biggest numbers we've ever had," she said, noting that there will be more windows decorated for shoppers to choose from for the window decoration contest.

Throughout the open house event there will be a recipe walk involving participating merchants who will share a treat and the recipe for making it at home. "It's our 17th annual recipe walk," said Nowak. "People can go to all the different stores and pick up a recipe. Some of the merchants are going to have samples of the recipes, not all of them will, but some of them will."

She said the event will offer plenty of things for people to see and do. "We still have the Grinch coming this year,

we've added a few more decorations, so it's basically the same as last year, just a little more oomph," she said. # Ukulele learners find connection in new club

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A new club at the Tecumseh Senior Center has a group of people plinking and strumming every Monday morning as they learn how to play the ukulele in the Tecumseh Ukulele Club. Started about a month ago by musician Bruce Fogelson and Tecumseh resident Tom Minor, the group has up to 10 members who meet at the center from 9:30-10:30 a.m. Mondays. The club offers free ukulele classes to anyone who wants to join.

Center Director Kim Otto said Fogelson and Minor stopped into the center one day and asked her if she thought anyone would be interested in learning the instrument. She wasn't sure if it would be

popular, but agreed to advertise the club. "Some of my seniors started and they brought their own ukuleles. It's really kind of cool," she said.

The six students in attendance Monday, including one person from Clayton and the rest from Tecumseh, are of varying ages and levels of ability.

"Bob is one of the bravest people here, because he couldn't even sing one note before he came here," Minor said of student Bob Dieterle. "Never touched a piano or anything else in his life. He was asking me what's the difference between a note and a chord."

Willie Brunty is another member of the club. "Here's another character. He's been playing strings since he was a

kid, and he owns about every stringed instrument you can think of except maybe the violin, and he just added the uke," said Minor.

He pointed out that one of the club's members, Trinity Bagdon of Tecumseh, is a homeschooled student. "Homeschool students can get extra credit for music," he said of the classes.

Minor said students can stay after the hour of instruction to ask questions and talk about music. He said those who are interested can bring their own instrument, "Or just come, and I have a couple extra ukuleles they can play until they are comfortable with buying one." He can give advice on price ranges for purchasing an instrument once a student gets to that point.

# Celebrating National Hospice and Palliative Care month and caring for our Veterans

As we enter the month of November, we are reminded that holiday celebrations are soon upon us. November is also National Hospice and Palliative Care month. This is an opportunity to remind our communities about the choices they have for their healthcare. We at Hospice of Lenawee seek any opportunity to educate our community about what hospice care is and how we can help. In the upcoming weeks of November, watch for other columns that will explore the significance of this month and help to dispel the myths that so often get in the way of seeking end-of-life care.

At Hospice of Lenawee, we are also aware that November holds a special significance for an important subset of our patients: our veterans. As we approached Veterans Day, we were busy preparing for how we could make this month about honoring our patients and their families who have served in the military, as well as other veterans in the community.

Hospice of Lenawee partners with the Veterans Administration in the national program known as We Honor Veterans. We see November as a wonderful opportunity to partner with the many organizations in Lenawee County who are committed to serving our veterans and honoring their ser-

vice and sacrifice. We look forward to meeting with the many veterans within our community and thanking them for their service. We are working to build strong connections in our community to support all veterans.

The National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization (NHPCO) started the We Honor Veterans program to support and educate hospices in the care of veterans. We educate our staff about the unique challenges that veterans may face as they near the end of their journey, issues that may be specific to the era and length of their service. We gather military history and ensure that our veterans have access to their veteran benefits. We conduct pinning ceremonies for those who desire them, honoring and thanking them in a ceremony surrounded by their loved ones.

We recruit veteran volunteers who visit our patients who have served in the military. Sometimes only another veteran can understand and accept the stories that are burning to be told. Our volunteers receive 24 hours of training to make sure that they have the tools they need to help our veterans. We invite experts with the veteran service organizations to come to Hospice of Lenawee to educate our staff on the unique needs of veterans.

We currently serve veterans from World War II, the Korean Conflict, the Vietnam War, and Desert Storm.

We learn many lessons from our veterans. They are our humble heroes. When we talk to them about pinning ceremonies, we often are at first met with resistance as they don't feel they deserve the honor or attention. Their sense of duty is strong, and they would rather serve than be served. But when we do have the privilege of providing a pinning ceremony for one of our veterans, we know we are sharing a space of significance with them. It is our privilege to have the opportunity to thank them for their service. Often, we are told that they are hearing that thanks for the first time since their return. ## Don't make shoveling a marathon event

With the first big snow of the season, area residents will need to clear out their driveways and sidewalks. The American Heart Association warns that for most people, shoveling snow may not lead to health problems, however, the risk of a heart attack during snow shoveling increases for others.

One of the reasons heart attacks can occur during snow shoveling is the combination of colder temperatures and physical exertion, which increases the workload on the heart. As a result, too much strain on the heart during these conditions can cause a heart attack. To help make snow removal safer, consider the following tips.

Consult a doctor. If you have a medical condition or don't exercise on a regular basis, schedule a meeting with your doctor prior to the first anticipated snowfall.

Take frequent breaks during shoveling so you don't overstress your heart.

Don't eat a heavy meal prior or soon after shoveling since it can place an extra load on your heart.

Don't drink alcoholic beverages before or immediately after shoveling. Alcohol may increase a person's sensation of warmth and may cause them to underestimate

the extra strain their body is under in the cold.

Be aware of the dangers of hypothermia. Heart failure causes most deaths in hypothermia. Wear a hat and dress in layers of warm clothing, which trap air between layers forming a protective insulation.

Use a small shovel or consider a snow thrower. Lifting heavy snow can raise blood pressure acutely. It is safer to lift smaller amounts more times, than to lug a few huge shovelfuls of snow. When possible, simply push the snow.

Listen to your body. If you feel the warning signs for heart attack, stop what you're doing immediately and call 9-1-1.

The warning signs of a heart attack include:

Uncomfortable pressure, fullness, squeezing or pain in the center of the chest that lasts for more than a few minutes, or goes away and comes back.

Pain spreading to the shoulders, neck and arms.

Chest discomfort with lightheadedness, fainting, sweating, nausea or shortness of breath.

# TPS board members consider purchase of 12-passenger van

2,645 students, so district enrollment has increased by 48 students over projection.

The foundation allowance, which is funding received primarily by the state, is approximately \$8,000 per student, which has also increased. "The board had budgeted for an increase in the foundation allowance of \$150 per student, and that increase came in at \$240," he said. "So between those two things and the fact that our audited fund balance from last school year came in about \$500,000 better than the forecast, the real deficit for the year is far less. I think they had reported about \$1.4 million at one time, and we're really only looking at about \$200,000." The fund equity going into this school year is closer to 18% instead of the 14% that was previously forecasted.

"It's still fewer kids than we had last year at this time, but we also graduated about 39 more kids than we registered as kindergarteners, so it's kind of an organic loss," said Hilderley. "Slowly, over time, we'll hopefully bring some families back or continue to have larger kindergarten classes."

Cameras are to be installed outside of the school buildings thanks to \$53,000 from a security grant awarded last spring by Michigan State Police and the Department of Homeland Security. Hilderley said the project needs to be wrapped up by June 2020, and vendors will be bidding on the installation and will start in the spring. He said the district identified 127 locations inside and outside the buildings where the devices could be used, but the grant will only pay for 55. The determination was made to focus on exterior cameras at this time.

An anonymous donation of \$2,000 was accepted

that means is that in three years, we would pretty much save the cost of a van by not using the bus," he said.

In other financial news, student enrollment after the student count date came in at 2,693. Hilderley said the board had budgeted for

for the SeaPerch robotics program.

In a continuation of the discussion on whether to continue custodial services through EDUStaff or seek a contract with an outside custodial services company, Hilderley said he asked the board to accept proposals for those services in order to compare costs. Current custodians are not technically Tecumseh Public Schools employees and do not receive retirement contributions from the district. Cost, quality of work, and management are all factors to look at in that decision. "When the previous board made the change and brought back custodial in-house, they said that there would be a time when they should review our costs in comparison to other vendors again, so we're more than three years removed from that decision and the board feels like it's time to make that comparison," he said.

Regarding 2020-21 district reorganization, Hilderley said he surveyed the staff for their suggestions on what is needed, and will compile the information and have building meetings through November and December. In addition, a community/parent survey will be created to get more input. Changes will be discussed at the December meetings to allow for time in the second semester to prepare for any grade level configuration changes.

A traffic flow issue at Compass Learning Center is being addressed by prohibiting northbound Maumee Street drivers from turning left into the school's circle drive between 7-9 a.m. and 2-4 p.m. on school days. "It starts to back up all the way to the stoplight, so that ordinance was put in over a year ago," said Hilderley. "Last Monday Tecumseh Police Department decided to begin enforcement."

Two closed sessions were held during the meeting regarding a student expulsion hearing and for the board to have a meeting with their attorney. In the good news portion of the meeting, a Tecumseh parent was praised for her actions in bringing a runaway fifth-grade student to safety when she saw the student walking outside. "I talked to her, she didn't want any recognition, but I thanked her on behalf of the board and I told her I was going to tell her story without using her name," Hilderley said.

# NOH Center offers shelter for women, children

the world."

Hollenbeck was previously the assistant director and took on the role of director in mid-October. She said she is invested in guiding each of the families in finding their place in the ministry and in the Tecumseh community. "We currently have a waiting list as we are slowly filling the rooms and building relationships with the current residents. It's hard to believe that just less than three months ago we opened the doors to this ministry and our first resident came that day," she said. The center has welcomed women without children as well as those with children who are school-aged, preschoolers, toddlers, and an infant.

"The Tecumseh community has proven it is a neighbor of hope to us in so many ways. There isn't a day that goes by that I do not receive a call offering donations or assistance," she said. "We have received food, clothing and general donations of cleaning supplies, paper goods, small appliances, cribs, baby equipment, hats, gloves, scarves, blankets and beautiful handmade prayer shawls for the moms in our program."

Of the many ways that people support the organization's ministry, Hollenbeck said one is in prayer, another is from the talents and time of individuals, and finally, the community has supported the center through donations, either monetary

or by providing daily items the ministry uses. She said the center's Thanksgiving dinner is being provided by donors and the Christmas dinner has also been arranged, with families "adopted" by local ministries and service agencies.

A total of 56 people have become volunteers with the ministry through six training sessions. In addition, community members have partnered with the center to provide a meal weekly, monthly, or when their schedule allows. Other volunteers have provided hand massages, baked cookies with the children, made crafts, played games, sung gospel songs, socialized, or offered prayer and bible study time. According to Hollenbeck, staff and volunteers are present around the clock, and when asked, each of the women who volunteer feels "called" to the ministry.

Agencies and organizations that partner with the center include Tecumseh Public Schools, Head Start, Lenawee Great Start, Lenawee Community Mental Health, Lenawee County Department of Human Services, local churches, service organizations, Tecumseh Public Library, local restaurants, the Tecumseh Police Department and ProMedica. Hollenbeck said the women who are capable of working have secured employment and the children are enrolled

in Tecumseh schools, with preschoolers attending Head Start.

"Residents have the opportunity for Growing Hope sessions whereby they can strengthen their faith through study of the Word, financial management is offered, NOH Wellness Director Tim Ruple provides guidance to guests, and parenting classes are available to those who are interested," she said.

NOH, which also has programs for men in Adrian, held its annual fall fundraiser Saturday night at the Tecumseh Center for the Arts and nearly filled the auditorium by selling 499 tickets to see nationally known comedian Jeff Allen. The funds will support general operating expenses for the nonprofit's programs. Hollenbeck said Allen also toured the women and children's facility and provided the residents with hope and encouragement from his own past.

"Thanks to all who are supportive from Tecumseh and across the county, it truly is a soulful experience to be a part of the Women and Children's Ministry Center," she said.

# City plans to save bathhouse at 'Pit,' grant to aid project

Citing feedback from the community to save the limestone bathhouse at Tecumseh Park (The Pit) from demolition, city officials have dropped plans to raze the facility.

A recommendation had been presented to council previously to demolish the building and replace rest rooms there with a prefabricated structure that would have had separate bathrooms for men and women with one toilet each.

A grant from the Michigan DNR of \$75,000 had been received for construction of the facility with an additional \$35,000 in city funds.

According to City Manager Dan Swallow, the DNR will allow the grant to be used to renovate a portion of the current bathhouse for rest rooms.

Parks and Recreation Director Sarah Gilmore said the renovation project will be the first phase of a long-range plan to rehab the existing bathhouse.

Swallow said future plans

may include opening up the remainder of the building as a covered outdoor pavilion. He said Kriehoff-Lenawee has been assisting with the project.

The bathhouse was erected in the 1960s.

# First county high school hockey team plays preseason scrimmage

The long-awaited inaugural season of the Lenawee United Hockey varsity team, a co-op team comprised of high school players from Adrian, Tecumseh, Clinton, Onsted, Addison, Lenawee Christian and Madison schools, opened Saturday, Nov. 9 with a preseason scrimmage with the Lake (Ohio) High School Flyers at Adrian College's Arrington Ice Arena. Although the Flyers bested Lenawee United by 5-1, the excitement of finally reaching this point is propelling the organizers and players onward.

After the construction of the ice arena in 2007, youth hockey participation in Lenawee County grew. Gregg DeVitto, president of the Adrian Youth Hockey Association that oversees Lenawee United Hockey, said when he took over as president in 2012 the idea of having a high school hockey team really

began to build up steam, and the association began the task of discovering the guidelines for a co-op team made up of players from different county schools. First they brought the idea to the athletic directors of Tecumseh and Adrian public schools.

"We had to work through the athletic directors to say, 'What are the limits in terms of a co-op?'" he said. The regulations said they had to stay under a total of 3,500 high school students enrolled in the districts that were part of the co-op, regardless of the number of schools, in order to form a Division 1 varsity co-op program.

At that time, there were only about 20 players in the Adrian Youth Hockey Association, so it took vision to imagine a varsity team. "It seemed far-fetched at the time, but once we put the marketing plan together and once we put the business plan together, and showed how through each year we could take a gradual step getting to that

point, then we had more people start to believe and understand," said DeVitto.

He said team members played in a summer high school league in Chelsea as well as participating in a fall league, playing other Southeastern Conference schools they will face during the regular season. "The group of kids who are hockey players who have been doing this now, at least at the high school level since June, to finally get to this point it's extremely exciting," he said. "To see the excitement within the communities, this really strikes a chord as to why we wanted to do high school hockey."

The organization held tryouts for the varsity co-op team at Chelsea's Arctic Coliseum on November 4 and 5 to prepare the team for play in the 2019-20 Michigan High School Athletic Association scholastic season. Local players include Tecumseh High School seniors Cole TenBroeck and Anna Benbow,

juniors Keegan Reau and Brian Gotham, and sophomore Jacob Benbow; and Clinton High School junior Matt DeVitto and freshman Logan DeVitto. The team's head coach is Don Cooper.

"Michigan is a state that for years, the more talented players would choose the route of playing triple A hockey for a very high cost," said DeVitto. "The reason we were so passionate about creating high school hockey was the fact that here you get to play with your

classmates, you get to earn a varsity letter for your school, and you get to participate for your community."

On Saturday special teams dictated the contest with Lake converting three of five power play opportunities, while Lenawee United went 0-for-5 on their man-advantages. 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
